Playgrounds aren't just for kids anymore. Senior and multigenerational play spaces are becoming more common, giving older adults a place to work out, walk, swing and simply have fun. Already popular in Asia and Europe, the trend is spreading across the U.S. with several companies building the outdoor facilities, which are designed with low-impact exercise equipment that promotes flexibility, balance and coordination. The fitness parks also serve as social hubs for seniors.

Remember When: Iceboxes

Keeping food and drinks cool was a chore before electric refrigerators and freezers became common household appliances. At the turn of the 20th century, nearly every home's kitchen or pantry had an icebox—a wooden cabinet that was lined with zinc or tin and kept cool by a large block of ice. As the ice melted, it drained into a drip pan that had to be emptied often. Some iceboxes included an exterior access door so the iceman could deliver ice without having to come into the house.



Word Play

Wordsmiths will be strategizing to score big at this month's National Scrabble Championship. Hundreds will gather to play the classic board game at the five-day tournament, which awards a cash prize to the top word wizard. For more than 60 years, players worldwide have been creating words using lettered tiles placed in crossword-style formation. Wild World: Platypus

The duck-billed platypus is one of the world's strangest animals. With the body of an otter, tail of a beaver, and the bill and webbed feet of a duck, this cat-sized creature is right at home in Australia's rivers and lakes. Using sensors on their bills to detect moving prey, platypuses spend up to two minutes underwater scooping up insects, worms and shellfish. Males have spurs on their hind feet that release venom when they feel threatened. In addition to these unique traits, platypuses possess another ability that contributes to their weird and wacky reputation: They are one of the only mammals that lay eggs.

Remember When: Blackboards

For many students, the blackboard was a classroom fixture, and cleaning its erasers was a common school day chore. The black slate boards were reportedly first used at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., in 1801. In the 1960s, schools changed to boards that were made of steel, coated with porcelain-based enamel and tinted green. The color was considered easier on the eyes, and chalk lines erased more easily from the coated surface.

Enjoy a Safe Summer

Outdoor summer fun can sometimes lead to injuries. Be prepared for any seasonal hazards with the following prevention and first aid tips.

Bee stings. A blunt-edged object like a credit card works best to remove a bee's stinger. Clean the area with soap and water, then apply cortisone cream or calamine lotion. If a serious reaction develops, seek medical attention.

Poison ivy or poison oak. The plants' oils often cause an allergic reaction, so remove the oils as soon as possible by washing the affected area with soap and water. If a rash develops, soothe skin with a baking soda bath. An over-the-counter oral antihistamine and topical cortisone cream can ease the itching.

Tick bites. Wear long pants and long-sleeved shirts in tick-infested areas; insect repellent also helps. If you find a tick on your skin, remove it with tweezers, then clean the bite and apply antiseptic. If the bite site expands or develops a rash within 30 days, see your doctor.

Sunburn. Reduce the risk of sunburn by staying indoors between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. and always wearing sunscreen. If you get sunburned, treat the pain and inflammation with cool compresses and ibuprofen. Seek medical advice if the sunburn is severe.



Freshly Cut Grass Stimulates Your Brain

The scent of just-cut grass is a familiar one this time of year. Not only is it instantly recognizable, but it can also be powerful. Neuroscientists say a freshly mowed lawn releases chemicals that can affect the parts of the brain that produce happiness and relaxation and may prevent cell damage that can cause age-related memory loss. The researchers have even bottled the aroma into a spray so that people can reap the benefits anytime.



A Home Fit for a King

The name Graceland is almost as famous as the estate's owner, the King of Rock 'n' Roll, Elvis Presley. Each August, tens of thousands of fans gather in Memphis, Tenn., to celebrate Elvis Week and take part in events at Graceland. Here are some details about the place Elvis called home.

Presley's purchase. At age 22, Elvis bought the estate in 1957 for \$102,500, which would be about \$870,000 today. Among his first additions to the 10,000-square-foot house were the famous music-themed iron gates.

Relatives in residence. The mansion was also home to Elvis' parents, Vernon and Gladys, as well as his paternal grandmother, Minnie Mae. Later, wife Priscilla moved in, and their daughter, Lisa Marie, grew up at Graceland.

Hawaiian hangout. Elvis' love of Hawaii influenced the legendary Jungle Room, which was decorated with Polynesian-style wood-carved furniture, green shag carpet on the floor and ceiling, exotic plants and an indoor waterfall.

Television trio. Like today's "man caves," Elvis' TV room featured comfortable furniture and what was an extravagance at the time—three side-by-side TV sets so he could watch multiple sporting events or programs at once.

"This Month In History"

AUGUST

1846: An act of Congress establishes the Smithsonian Institution. The museum and research complex was named for British scientist James Smithson, who bequeathed his \$500,000 estate to the U.S.

1902: Theodore Roosevelt becomes the first U.S. president to make a public appearance riding in a car.

1909: The Indianapolis Motor Speedway holds its first race. The track is home to the annual Indy 500, called the "Greatest Spectacle in Racing."

1926: At the age of 19, American Gertrude Ederle becomes the first woman to swim the 21 miles of the English Channel.

1932: Famed pilot Amelia Earhart flies from Los Angeles to Newark, N.J., making her the first woman to fly solo from coast to coast.

1959: President Dwight D. Eisenhower signs an executive order proclaiming Hawaii the 50th state of the union.

1961: Singer Patsy Cline records the ballad "Crazy" in Nashville.

1969: More than 500,000 people attend the three-day Woodstock Music and Art Fair at a farm near Bethel, N.Y. The Who, Jimi Hendrix and the Grateful Dead were among the festival's famous acts.

1996: Sprinter Michael Johnson breaks the world record in the men's 200-meter and wins a gold medal at the Summer Olympic Games in Atlanta.

2009: The U.S. Senate confirms Sonia Sotomayor as the nation's first Hispanic Supreme Court justice.
